
## NISE UP 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

2024 marked Rise Up's 15th anniversary of creating lasting change — a milestone year for Rise Up Leaders who transformed the lives of more than 25 million people globally, improving health, education, and economic opportunities for girls, women, and gender-nonconforming people. With the unwavering generosity of our partners, we invested in 98 extraordinary new leaders and supported them to successfully advocate for 10 new and improved laws and policies across the U.S., India, Nigeria, Brazil, and Mexico. As a vital intermediary in our sector, Rise Up invested over \$680,000 in direct grants and field-building support to advance gender equity and justice worldwide.

At Rise Up, we know that **building power** is about more than policy change — it's about shifting resources, amplifying voices, and ensuring that those most affected by injustice lead the solutions. And with power comes something just as transformative: joy. The joy of a girl finishing school, a woman accessing the health care she needs, and a future where gender justice is not just an aspiration, but a reality — where girls in STEM programs receive the same mentorship opportunities as boys, where the gender wage gap vanishes, and where LGBTQ+ youth feel safe everywhere they go.

Building on our successes in 2024, Rise Up is embarking on an exciting new chapter. After 15 years of fiscal sponsorship, we are stepping into our own power to become an independent nonprofit strengthening our capacity for innovation and efficacy to deepen our impact for the communities we serve. ## **ENSURING** THAT **MILLIONS OF GIRLS IN INDIA CAN FINISH** SCHOOL

Growing up in Rajasthan, India, Rise Up Leader Poonam Jonwal saw firsthand how girls' futures were often cut short — by early marriage, harassment, and above all, by the simple denial of an education. As one of five sisters in a large family, she witnessed the barriers girls faced to stay in school. "I realized that education is the key for girls to escape social evils," Poonam told Rise Up. "But I wasn't ready to lead yet — I was hesitant, unsure how to step into a leadership role."

That reluctance changed when Poonam joined Rise Up's Leadership Accelerator. Selected through a rigorous process, she gained new tools — policy analysis, advocacy strategy development, leadership skills, project design, and more. With Rise Up's funding and support, Poonam developed a strategic plan to solve a major obstacle keeping girls out of the classroom: school fees. Although free education for all children in India is guaranteed by law, school fees often prevent girls from finishing school.

### Poonam worked tirelessly to ensure that girls could complete their education.

Through coordination with key stakeholders, she led efforts to establish a statewide education complaints board to resolve issues affecting students' access to quality education. This government-mandated body is made up of child rights officials, government representatives, parents, teachers, and community representatives — all tasked with investigating challenges facing students and families such as illegal school fees, poor sanitation, and gender discrimination, and taking concrete actions to fix them.

Because of Poonam's efforts, nearly 10 million students across Rajasthan can now attend school and receive the education they deserve.

This model doesn't just remove barriers to education — it puts girls at the center of change. Through Poonam's leadership, girls are now active members of School Management Committees, effectively advocating for clean and safe bathrooms, regular sanitary pad distribution, better sports facilities, and more women teachers.

Today, Poonam leads statewide efforts to drive systemic change and ensure all students' access to quality education. "I made sure girls weren't just beneficiaries — they became decision-makers," she explained. "Because of Rise Up, I am no longer hesitant. I am a leader — and I am strengthening the system for girls."

## **IMPROVING SAFETY AND SUPPORT FOR 13 MILLION WOMEN IN SÃO** PAULO, BRAZIL

In Brazil, a woman is assaulted every six minutes (The Guardian). Three Rise Up Leaders united to transform the devastating increase in gender-based violence for women in São Paulo. With training and funding from Rise Up, Marília Moreira, Fernanda Martins, and Renata Guadagnin came together to stand up for survivors of gender-based violence.

"Violence against women is a global public health crisis because its effects go beyond the individual or domestic sphere, overwhelming health care systems and perpetuating cycles of poverty, exclusion,

and gender inequality," explained the team, highlighting that Brazil is among the top five countries globally for femicides.

Leveraging their complementary skillsets and expertise, Marília, Fernanda, and Renata created an ambitious joint advocacy strategy to create large-scale impact. "We understood that collective advocacy would strengthen our proposal and increase our chances of success."

Engaging survivors and community members, the leaders developed São Paulo's Unified Protocol for Communication and Assistance to Women Victims of Violence. This landmark legislation ensures that women in violent situations receive coordinated care and services, reduces the risk of re-victimization, and improves data collection to inform better public policy. In August 2024, government leaders signed the new protocol, positively impacting the lives of 13 million women in São Paulo.

Learning new ways to look at and objectively solve problems that affect girls and women was one of" the highlights of the Rise Up experience," shared Fernanda. "The methodology, with its clear and welldefined strategies, significantly broadened my understanding of how to actively confront political and social challenges using practical tools."

The three leaders are now working to expand their success nationally to transform how Brazil responds to gender-based violence and urge the country to recognize it as a public health priority. "Despite the inequalities and injustices, being connected in a network with others especially women — who fight together, believing that these are collective struggles and that only through unity can we build equity, is what keeps us inspired and motivated to continue."

### BRIDGING THE DIGITAL LITERACY **DIVIDE FOR ADOLESCENT GIRLS IN NIGERIA**

In a world increasingly shaped by technology, Rise Up Leader Franklin Pyokpung Zaure saw that adolescent girls in rural communities in Nigeria were being left behind, unable to gain the digital skills needed to thrive. "For women and girls in my community, digital literacy is empowering and opens doors to economic opportunities by equipping them with essential skills," Franklin said. "Digital literacy enables women and girls to overcome barriers like mobility constraints and societal norms, fostering inclusion in digital economies."

Determined to create a brighter future for marginalized girls, Franklin brought digital literacy and skills training to nearly 362,000 rural girls and women across Kaduna State by expanding the Kaduna Digital Incubation Program (KAD-DIP), with Rise Up's funding and support.

Originally established by the government, the Digital Incubation Program was intended to equip girls with vital digital skills, but Franklin quickly realized that the program was not reaching those who needed it most — adolescent girls in remote and underserved areas. Through his organization, the Creative Arts for Development Center, Franklin led efforts to extend the Digital Incubation Program's reach to rural communities, opening up new opportunities for girls who had long been excluded from digital spaces. By equipping rural girls with access to affordable tech devices and providing them with training to develop digital skills and market their products online, Franklin is creating pathways to economic mobility for girls that were previously out of reach.

"The transformative support provided by Rise Up, ranging from comprehensive training and strategic guidance to network and financial resources, made it possible for me to craft effective plans and build the confidence to drive meaningful changes in my community," Franklin said.

By giving adolescent girls the tools to build their digital literacy, Franklin is bridging the digital gender divide, opening doors to education, employment, and leadership that will transform entire communities for generations to come.

## BUILDING **POWER FOR GENDER JUSTICE ACROSS CALIFORNIA**

Rise Up is expanding our work in the U.S. by fueling bold, community-led change in California. In 2024, 24 California-based leaders joined our Leadership and Advocacy Accelerator, where they developed powerful strategies to advance gender equity state-wide.

Following the training, Rise Up awarded over \$500,000 in grant funding to six transformative projects to improve health, education, and economic outcomes across California. These initiatives tackle a wide range of challenges — such as improving Black maternal and newborn health outcomes, promoting economic mobility for families, developing solutions to address homelessness, and ensuring that LGBTQ+ youth are safe in school. Each project is led by Rise Up Leaders who are closest to the issues in their own communities and best positioned to drive meaningful change.

Our funding partners are a vital part of this work. Olivia Scott, Corporate Responsibility Manager at Cummins Inc., joined the Accelerator to gain a deeper understanding of Rise Up's Leaders, team, and curriculum.

"As a participant, I became a collaborator, supporter, and ultimately a friend to the members of this cohort," Olivia shared. "I transitioned from a big-picture funder to someone linked in arms on a shared journey to create a better future." Together, we're building a more equitable California — led by those driving lasting change in their communities.

### **MEETING URGENT NEEDS IN A CHANGING CLIMATE**

Climate crises have disproportionate impacts on women and girls around the world. As climaterelated disasters intensify globally, Rise Up Leaders are developing innovative solutions to address the environmental threats facing women and girls. From flooded schools to health centers lost to wildfires to rising rates of gender-based violence, climate challenges demand urgent, gender-responsive solutions. Rise Up Leaders are meeting this moment, advocating for genderinclusive policies, strengthening local systems, and ensuring the most affected communities are not left behind.

One powerful example comes out of Nigeria. Rise Up Leader Anastesia Ezeolisa is advocating for legislation to protect women and girls in Anambra state from the gendered impacts of annual flooding and other climate disasters. "Women are often left out of flood preparedness and response planning, meaning their needs such as reproductive health services and gender-separated shelters are often overlooked," explained Anastesia.

With Rise Up's funding, coaching, and support, Anastesia's advocacy will strengthen the state's implementation of gender-sensitive emergency response policies to protect more than 1 million people and ensure sustainable economic recovery for affected women and girls. This systemic change will foster resilience and center the needs of the most vulnerable women and girls in Anambra State. By supporting leaders like Anastesia, Rise Up is strengthening resilience and equity where it's needed most — enabling communities around the world to thrive despite growing environmental uncertainty

## "Local leaders have the solutions: Why aren't we funding them?"

Alliance magazine highlighted Rise Up's research on how funders can better support communitydriven solutions, addressing the stark reality that only 2 percent of global funding reaches local leaders and organizations who are creating change in their own communities. Co-authored by Rise Up's Executive Director Dr. Denise R. Dunning, Director of Learning Josie Ramos, and Rise Up Leader Alejandra García Muñiz, the article features insights from the 2022 external evaluation conducted by Dalberg Advisors, which drew on research with 220 Rise Up Leaders in 14 countries to identify concrete strategies for how philanthropy can better support local leaders and organizations.

Sadia is standing up for the rights of youth in California by addressing the often-overlooked issue of early and forced marriage — an urgent problem affecting an estimated 9,000 young people annually across the state. Through survivor-centered research and policy advocacy, she is working to establish a statewide ban on child marriage.




